Growing with Grace — "Gather for yourself in your youth a great treasure of good habits" (Mary Ward)

We have all had difficult times and challenges in our lives, and most of us feel that we learn something from those experiences. At the same time, few people become wise in the course of their lives. While most of us become or remain well-adapted, happy and satisfied, quite

a few are bitter or depressed. In life, as we grow, psychological resources crucially influence how people appraise life challenges, how they deal with them, and how they integrate them into their life story as time goes on. It is important to gain Mastery of one's life in our younger days, Openness to accept and surrender and Constant Examination of self as St. Ignatius of Loyola tells us.

Our first proposition is that life experiences challenge a person's beliefs and are the main context in which growth manifests itself and is necessary for the continual development of the person. The experience in life should help individuals to manifest maturity and grace in the face of these challenging situations. Most people have a healthy attitude that helps to maintain stability and well-being in individuals. We are realistically aware of the uncertainty and unpredictability of life, while also feeling that, having learned from experience, we will somehow be able to master whatever happens. With trust in one's own ability and openness to accept and embrace uncertainty we move forward.

Optimistic people are non-judgmental. They accept goals and values that differ from their own and enjoy learning from others. They look for new experiences and adapt well to the changes in life. There are many examples like Solomon who chose the gift of courage and strength to learn from his life experience and trust in God. He chose an understanding heart, so he could make good decisions for his people. God was so pleased with Solomon's choice that He gave him every other good gift, too.

Wisdom and understanding demands ongoing learning, and this can only come from true openness to different points of view and a belief that we don't already have all the answers. Experienced people also have a sense of humility, realizing their point of view is not the only one and appreciating how much they don't know. Diversity demands asking questions and listening to expand understanding, appreciating all that is unknown.

Mary Ward, Our Inspiration

Mary Ward was born in Yorkshire in 1585. It was the best of times for many, especially the young who grasped life and joined in exploring new lands, creativity in literature, music etc. New political philosophies were emerging, but religion was a dangerous path to tread. It was the worst of times for Catholics; persecution was at its height. Yet the Ward family

remained staunchly Catholic. At fifteen she resolved to enter the most austere religious order. Then God intervened, making it clear that she was not to be a Poor Clare, nor to join any existing religious order, but was to do something that would be greatly to the Glory of God. 'I would have no more than His will.' So there were to be no ostentatious heroics in Mary's future, but just the step by step discernment of God's will. Seven like-minded young girls joined her. They practised a very austere life.

A revelation in 1611 directed Mary to follow the Ignatian way of life. Her work never stopped even in times of adversity.

In January 1645, she was buried in Osbaldwick. As daughters of Mary Ward there is a clear call to each one of us to know the Will of God. Today we have different situations like drought, poverty, political turmoil, persecutions on minority religions etc. Let us draw inspiration from Mary Ward to spread God's Kingdom here on earth. Christ is labouring with us lovingly and energetically as Mary Ward says, 'It is an honour to work for God.'

Temporary Professed Sisters' Corner

'Religious life and smartphone with Data'

'Religious life and smartphone with Data,' an online Workshop, was conducted for the Temporary Professed Sisters of our Province on 6th August 2022. The online seminar is the first of the Loreto Lights series - a monthly animation Program for TPs.

Sr. Michelle Mathias from the Daughters of St Paul, an Expert in Media and a professor in NISCORT, New Delhi, was chosen as the resource person to guide the TPs on using digital media effectively in mission and Life.

In an interactive mode, Sr. Michelle began the session by introducing all the TPs and connected herself well with every participant enabling an atmosphere of ease and excitement.

She emphasized how social media could be an effective tool in the hands of religious men and women in their ministry if used wisely and efficiently.

She shared several practical examples and cases where social media easily traps many religious people in online chats and unhealthy online friendships, sometimes leading them to addictions.

The TPs appreciated the session because they felt "it was enriching, informative, inspiring and certainly left a huge learning in us." The session led to questions, clarifications, and suggestions, paving the way for more such sessions in the future. With experts from various fields, Loreto Lights Series aims to illumine, inform and interact with TPs on topics that are essential for a growing religious in the digital age.

Catechetical Course

My Experience Sr Sudha

My heart is filled with joy and gratitude to God.
To Him alone be all Glory!

The depth of my being vibrates with echoes of thanks to you, all my beloved Loreto Sisters, especially to Sr. Noelle, our General, Sr. Anita Braganza, our former Provincial, and the present Provincial, Sr. Sabrina, and the team for placing their trust in me. The sheer grace of God and your prayers helped me complete my studies. It was indeed a time of grace.

It looked like climbing the giant Mt. Everest when I began the research. However, the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley provided a conducive atmosphere to accomplish the task ahead. It was yet another blessing to live in the Convent of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary community during the years of my research. We were four in the community, and we took turns cooking and conducting common prayers. We were blessed with the Franciscan Church nearby, where I went for Mass every day. On weekends, I used to go for ministry outside to serve food to the poor and homeless.

When I recall the last five years of my academic life, I humble myself in the presence of God, who intervened in my life through many persons who contributed, strengthened, encouraged, challenged, and stood by me in times of struggle. I always prayed through Mary Ward, and she helped me challenge my fears and insecurities. I am genuinely grateful to God, who accompanied me throughout this academic journey.

TERTIANSHIP EXPERIENCE (the school of the heart)

Con.5-42 With others on a similar journey, the tertian seeks to review the meaning of her life, and renew her commitment to the mission of the Institute.

We began our Tertianship journey virtually as a group, remembering our calls to religious life. My process began by "GATHERING THE FRAGMENTS"; rediscovering the fire and energy of my vocation, discerning, reconciling, surrendering, and befriending myself, others and God and allowing myself to be led by the SPIRIT. It led to a reconnecting with my sense of

preciousness and of falling in love with God again and again. It necessitated taking the courage to listen to God and rediscover and claim my belongingness to the Institute. Ultimately the process continues to grow and pave a new pathway forward in my life.

The companions on this same journey accepted me and helped me. We felt a strong sense of togetherness and trust that allowed us to share openly and confidentially our joys and sorrows, our highs and lows. We developed a strong bond among ourselves, supporting and taking care of each other, appreciating and encouraging each other, as well as, challenging and accepting one another while listening non-judgmentally. I have a great sense of gratitude and feel energized with the friendship that enables me to respond continuously to God's persistent calling.

The image of The Potter and the Clay, reminded me constantly that I am being moulded lovingly. At the same time the opposite spirit was very much at work. It was a great challenge for me to accept my unpleasant past experiences –I realized that emotional attachments have distorted the image of God. These internal defensive structures limited my capacity for intimate relating with God and with others. The methods given to confront myself and others honestly and courageously brought healing in my relationships, with myself, with others and with God.

There is a renewed energy and spirit after learning more about Mary Ward. Her charism of justice, freedom, sincerity, felicity and rootedness in God continues to challenge me in my daily life. She had an immense courage and unflinching determination to face any obstacle or opposition. She urges me to be courteous, loving, forgiving and friendly in the community and challenges me to be a prophetic voice in society.

The Spiritual Exercises was the experience of rediscovering my preciousness. On this journey there was healing and purification of physical, emotional, psychological, mental, spiritual and intellectual understanding of self, others and God. So my pilgrimage was of reassurance of my faith that God created me just because He loves me and firmly believing that God will be there with me till the end. The fruit desired is to see God in everything and everything in God.

My Experience of being with leprosy patients was very challenging and it disturbed me to the core of my being

to see, to smell, to feel, to listen and to find God in the disfigured, distorted, senseless, painful and rejected bodies of the patients. Initially I could not even come to terms with the smell, the disfiguration, the severe pain, the senseless body parts and the suffering. The "WHY?" could never be answered? Yet gradually and eventually I was able to sit with the patients and try to feed and help them. However this hard reality brought in me the acceptance, dependency on God, compassion and conversion to love them. Along the journey the silent whisper—"His Body was disfigured" gave me comfort and courage to seek Him in them. I felt challenged yet felt consoled that the love of God was being demonstrated in the most practical, healing and loving ways.

I am grateful to Sr.Sabrina and the PLT, Sr. Noelle and the GLT and all the members of the Institute for the prayerful support and encouragement and for giving me this opportunity. Let God be praised.


We are grateful to our Sisters who have taken us on an amazing journey in the life of a Catechist. May we have the courage to 'Step Out'!









As the Bicentenary year of M. Teresa Ball's arrival in Ireland draws to a close, we bring you the last instalment in this series presenting correspondence between the Indian mission and the Mother House in Ireland. On 18 October 1860 M. Delphine Hart wrote her last extant letter to Teresa Ball. Hart was about to embark on her return journey to India, and was not to know that Teresa Ball had suffered an injurious fall the previous day, preventing her from communicating with the departing missioner.









M. Teresa Ball

3 Carlton Hill East St. John's Wood London October 18th 1860

My dearest Revd. Mother

When I was at York, I wrote to Monsignor Talbot for a dispensation from the 27th rule solely for India. I received in reply the accompanying letter, which I suppose dear Revd Mother alludes to you, as Mother of so many houses.

In York, Nuns do not use any of the money received from the Pupils for their own use; in India, we are obliged to depend on the Pupils for our support.

I shall leave London tomorrow for the continent and embark for Calcutta in the first December Steamer with S. Genevieve and three Postulants.

I felt rather pained, dear Revd Mother, not to have received a line from you before my departure from Ireland.

Begging your blessing, I remain, dear Revd Mother, Your very grateful and affectionate child,

Mary Delphine Hart.

Acknowledgements:

We gratefully acknowledge the support of Aine McHugh and Sr. Kathleen Fitzgerald of the Institute Archive. This series of Archive News articles, begun in September 2021, celebrating M. Teresa Ball's Bicentenary year, has only been made possible by their proactive support.

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And then in the month of August, 1861, Delphine Hart received a letter from M. Scholastica Somers, the Superior General designate, informing the India mission of the last days and demise of Teresa Ball. A door was closed on a correspondence of twenty years, and a new association initiated between Delphine Hart and Scholastica Somers.

M. Scholastica Somers entered Rathfarnham in 1840, four years after Delphine Hart, but was older to Hart by about 13 years. Keen to progress Teresa Ball's work of developing the Institute in Ireland and abroad, she continued the practice of regular correspondence with the superiors of the many Loreto missions. Below are excerpts from some of the letters received by Somers from Hart, in the ten year period from 1861 to 1871.



M. Scholastica Somers

Loretto House, Calcutta August 19th 1861

My dearest Mother Scholastica

I have received your kind and welcome letter, which gave me the particulars of our dear Revd. Mother's happy transit to her Heavenly home. May my last end be as happy as hers!

I feel more deeply interested than ever in my dear Sisters in Ireland. I shall never, never forget their kindness and affection to a poor missioner!

Calcutta, May 7th 1863

I was delighted to receive your letter by last mail. I am most anxious to get out the "Sacred Heart" as this Convent is dedicated to it. I may have an opportunity at the end of the year of sending to you for it. You will kindly let me [know] the expense incurred for [the] painting.

San Remo, November 7th 1870

I do not know what you must have thought of my long silence, but I have been very unsettled since I last wrote from Rome. I went then to Lodi, thinking the climate would suit my two young ladies; but I nearly lost one of them. Lodi is particularly unhealthy, very subject to fevers owing to the marshy soil.

Bavaria, July 14th 1871

I have received with feelings of affectionate gratitude your truly kind warmhearted letter. I am sorry I shall not be able to leave this [place] before the beginning of August, as I must wait for a remittance from India before I proceed further.... I expect a letter soon from my Archbishop to seal my fate. I have a presentiment that India is destined to be my burial place, but as I have not many more years to live, it matters little where I spend them, so that each hour is stamped by the Divine Will, the fulfilment of which alone will make me happy at death.

Social Ministry:


